In the aftermath of the march the damage to the building was extremely apparent. As we made our way back to the coaches, the chaos was still on going with riot police still battling the stragglers. Full length windows had been smashed and the entire reception lobby appeared to be tarnished with the likes of Tory hat graffiti and debris that had been thrown at the windows. The last hardcore few that were left were still in full swing lighting flares and burning placard cards.

Although many would argue that the riot has overthrown the point of the march, there is still a really strong consensus from NUS and Students' Unions around the country that our government will recognise how important this issue is for thousands of young people. Lauren Ellis said, "I hope people will at the march for what it really was, the hard work of NUS and Students' Unions to demonstrate how much education cuts will affect our lives".

Like we Ben Martin, a BAU student on the march felt that despite the chaos, the storm on 30 Millbank building at Bournemouth we were lucky enough to know that none of our students were involved and we carried on the march in peace. Lauren Ellis, a BU student felt the march still held its own. She more the Browne review recommends the removal of the cap on fees, which will allow Universities to charge from £6-12k a year for your education. Combined with education cuts, Universities will have no choice but to increase their fees to carry on operating at the level they do now, thus creating a serious squeeze on future students pockets!

The protest began in a whirlwind, of vibrant banners and tongue in cheek chants, which got us all hyped up and rowdy. The Bournemouth crowd were on top form as we took to the streets of parliament amongst everyone. BU HOSTS A SPECIAL VISIT FROM JOHANNESBURG STUDENTS

Students from CIDA City Campus in Johannesburg, South Africa paid a visit to Bournemouth University last month, looking to gain a valuable insight in to life at a UK university and learn from different practices and technology.

A CIDA lecturer accompanied two South African, one Ugandan and one Zimbabwean from the virtually free higher education facility, which provides education to young disadvantaged Africans, on their visit.

In a packed visit the four students met the Vice Chancellor and the Dean of the Media School, attended lectures and seminars, made presentations and were interviewed by students. They even paid us a visit in SUBU and spent sometime finding out everything

we provide for the students of Bournemouth. One of the students, Gertrude Kitonga, said : "The visit has been extraordinary. Quite life changing and quite different from what we had been expecting."

It has a particular value to her, as she has ambitions to set up a school like the CIDA Campus in Johannesburg in her homeland of Uganda. She says: "Going to university meant I had a future. There are millions of children who cannot go to university. That's why I wake up - to give someone else a chance." There have been link between Bournemouth University and CIDA since early last year and BU students have also visited them in the past. It is hoped that the two institutions will continue to work closely together.

RISE IN TUITION FEES BREACH ISLAMIC FAITH

Government plans to change the way we pay back our student loans and increase interest payments for higher earning students could prevent Muslim students from being able to accept them, effectively pricing them out of going to university.

Under the new procedure students earning more than £21,000 a year will be paying interest on their loans, potentially up to 3% above inflation. Some Muslims believe that their faith's teaching on finance doesn't allow them to use loans that include interest charges.

Obviously, with the Browne review meaning fees could rise as high as nine grand a year, many Muslim students keen to go to Uni could struggle to make ends meet with out being able to accept a loan.

While some Muslims do not think there is anything wrong with taking loans that include interest charges, a spokesman for Islamic student group FOSIS said that a 'significant number' would feel like their faith doesn't allow them to borrow the money.

In response to this the Government has claimed that student loans are not a form of commercial lending and that they are not making a profit

However, many claim that the raising of interest payments and increasing of student debt raises a bigger issue of ethics, further than the debate of suitability for Muslim students.
